How to Document a Feature

To document a feature correctly, the documentation team needs to create a range of pages, including a `aFeatureXGlosspage` (defining the feature), a `aFeatureXpage` that lists what the feature can do, a `aFeatureXDocspage` with step-by-step instructions, a `aFeatureXAdminpage` with step-by-step administrative procedures and tips, and a `aFeatureXSettings()` page that provides a quick overview of the feature's administrative settings.
